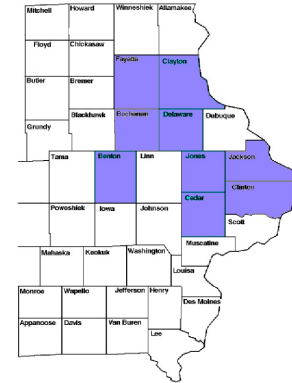

WHAT IS AN LEPC?

A local emergency planning committee consists of local officials including police, fire, emergency management, public health, transportation, environmental professionals, community groups, citizens, media and representatives of facilities subject to the emergency planning requirements. LEPCs must develop an emergency response plan, review it at least annually, and provide information about hazardous materials in the community to citizens.

LEPCs are supervised by the State Emergency Response Commission, designated by the Governor in each state.

The Region 6 LEPC consists of representatives of Benton, Buchanan Cedar, Clayton, Clinton, Delaware, Fayette, Jackson and Jones Counties. Membership includes representatives of local law enforcement, fire, emergency management and facilities. The Region 6 LEPC meets bi-monthly in rotating locations in the nine counties.

The Region 6 LEPC provides planning guidance for emergency response plans, secures training grants for hazardous materials response training for emergency responders and conducts hazardous materials training exercises within all nine counties.

WHY DO WE NEED LEPCs?

Local Emergency Planning Committees are at the front line providing community hazardous materials information and developing community emergency response plans. Under the federal Emergency Planning and Community Right-to-Know Act of 1986 requirements were set for federal, state and local governments, Indian Tribes and industry regarding emergency planning and “Community Right-to-Know” reporting on hazardous and toxic materials. Local emergency response plans developed by LEPCs contain information that community officials can use at the time of a hazardous materials incident.

In the event of a hazardous materials incident in your community, the LEPC could provide information to the emergency responders regarding hazardous materials on site, hazardous material quantities, and emergency contact information. In addition, LEPC sponsored planning, training, and exercising can better prepare communities for response and recovery to a hazardous materials incident.

WHAT IS OUR MISSION?

The Mission of the Region 6 LEPC is to protect the citizens of our counties by educating, training, planning, exercise and evaluation of plans and by encouraging participation within the Region 6 LEPC.

SHELTER-IN-PLACE



In case of emergency, sometimes the best place to go is nowhere at all. If an extreme condition exists because of an emergency you should stay inside your business, home, or enclosed building. Stay tuned to local TV or NOAA weather radio for the Emergency Alert System (EAS) to be activated. You may also sign up for Alert Iowa through your local emergency management agency. These systems allow residents to receive guidance from local authorities.



IF CAUGHT IN A CAR:

– close windows and ventilation system, shut off motor and tune into EAS on your radio.
